"10 TIPS FOR PROTECTING THE ELDER FROM TECHNOLOGY CRIME"

Almost everyone will agree that the use of computers has made life much simpler for all, children and adults. Access to the internet has become even a more useful tool in the daily lives of everyone. In real-time we can zip across the world in just seconds. We can access, locate and compile information with the simple touch of a button in a matter of seconds. Friends, family and workers all enjoy this fresh rush of being able to reach out and touch others and communicate their wishes between each other. However, the invention of the computer and the simple but powerful access to the World Wide Web can also a negative barrier for the elderly. Being faced with a very high-tech modern learning curve and a highly sophisticated new cyber culture senior adults are an unusually high risk to cyber crime. Many of these baby boomers were raised in a trusting human culture and neighborly friendly environment. The world today is not as friendly anymore, especially senior adults. Many of the customary values that boomers learned as a child are quickly being replaced with a different type of new value system that is less thoughtful. Senior adults are being taken advantage of because of their newly learned skill of surfing the internet. Below are some tips that senior adults may use to avoid becoming cyber crime victims.

- 1. Make sure the computer that is being used is equipped with a current anti-virus control program. They are cheaper than the trouble of using computers without one.
- 2. Do not give out personal information to strangers on the internet that send you email. Items such as your driver's license, credit cards, banking information and social security numbers should be kept safe and given out wisely with keen discernment.
- 3. Do not fill out forms that strangers send to you requesting personal information.
- 4. Do not share your pass words or pin numbers with anyone, family members or friends. Write them down and keep them in a safe place that only you will visit from time to time.
- 5. Do not participate in dating online.
- 6. Do not open or respond to email from people you don't know. Criminals use phishing (pronounced fishing) to lure you into traps. This is very dangerous and costly. DO NOT TRUST STRANGERS!
- ONLY MAKE PURCHASES ON TRUSTED SITES. Call East Side University Village Community Learning Center if you do not know trusted sites (713 747 9255).
- 8. DO NOT PARTICIPATE IN PRIZE GIVEAWAYS OR FREE TRIPS WEBSITES.
- 9. DO NOT GAMBLE ONLINE!
- Use multiple passwords for different accounts; do not store valuable personal information on non-secure websites.

Students completing all the units receive certificates of completion provided by Prairie View A&M and the Extension Service.



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







Astros Show Love to East Side!
